
Faith Community Annual Coat Drive

Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist

Announcement

There are currently only around 40 "active" EMs. We need 30 to cover the four Masses each weekend. Simple math tells you that each of the EMs will be asked for their service 3 out of every 4 weeks. Many EMs are also Proclaimers and it has been requested that one person not serve in both capacities on any given weekend.

Less than 1/3 of those who are "signed up" to be EMs responded to the recent survey regarding scheduling. About half of those (1/6 of total) expressed a desire to handle their own scheduling via the website, however, for whatever reason(s) very few of the EMs use the system. It was thought that since so many EMs were "no shows" when scheduled by someone else it would be better to have them take charge of their own schedule. You can see how poorly that has been working by the "4 needed" - "5 needed" for each Mass in the bulletin.

In order to alleviate these situations the following changes will be necessary starting **November 1st**:

There will only be **5** EMs for each Mass (6 at the 9:30)

– one to distribute the hosts and 4 to serve the wine. This is 2 fewer than we have now.

These **5** will be scheduled on a rotating basis and the schedule will once again be posted in the bulletin.

EMs will be responsible for finding a replacement if unable to serve a particular weekend.

It is unfortunate that these steps have to be taken but until we get more of the EMs who are signed up to become more active, or more parishioners willing to serve OLQP in the capacity of Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist, it is unavoidable.

Remember the new schedule begins the first weekend of November, the 2nd and 3rd.

Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time Cycle C



THEME: "Your faith has made you well."

Wellness implies more than health. Wellness is a state of completeness, wholeness, integrity. Our wellness depends on the choices we make. We can choose to exercise and eat a balanced diet to promote physical health, physical well-being. We can choose to learn and practice good communication skills to promote social well-being. We can choose to see and understand ourselves as caught up in something bigger than ourselves, to see ourselves loved and cared for by a higher power, to believe in and relate to a loving God to promote spiritual wellness. With faith, we can become whole and complete as God's loved creatures.

THE READINGS:

FIRST READING: II Kings 5:14-17

The first reading, from the Second Book of Kings, is part of the Elijah/Elisha cycle of stories. These stories represent an early stage is Israel's journey from polytheism to monotheism. In the ancient world, different people believed in and honored different gods. In the initial formation of the people of Israel, the people would have had no difficulty in understanding this and proclaiming that they had a special relationship with their God. In time, Israel began to see that Yahweh was, at least, more powerful, more effective than the gods of other nations. This view was prevalent in the earliest stories of Elijah and Elisha. Finally, however, the people began to understand that Yahweh was a living God, not a god of silver or stone, that Yahweh was the only God and that Yahweh had a will and plan that embraced all people. The later stories of Elijah and Elisha represent this view.

The story of Naaman, the Syrian, comes from the later stages in the cycle. Afflicted with a skin disease, Naaman is told by his Israelite serving girl that there is a prophet of Yahweh in Israel who could help him. Expecting to be required to perform some great task to effect his cure, Naaman is told, merely, to wash in the waters of the Jordan. When he is cured, he wants to give Elisha a present, but Elisha refuses. He is the messenger, not the one who performed the cure. That was God. Naaman responds with faith and wants to take Israelite soil home with him so he can offer sacrifices to the God who saved him. He still holds to the idea that there are many gods and that they are effective only in their local territory. He will take some of that territory home with him. Elisha models the role of Israel, God's chosen people, in the world – to make God's love and care for all people evident. Naaman may have a way to go in coming to believe in only one God, but he is on the way, and he was set on his way first of all by a simple Jewish serving girl. His road to wholeness started with simple trust.

SECOND READING: II Timothy 2:8-13

The second reading comes from the Second Letter to Timothy. The Pastoral Letters are among the later writings of the New Testament and reflect a time of trial and persecution. The writer of the letters, claiming to be Paul, is suffering for his commitment to proclaiming the word, but rejoices that while he is imprisoned, the Word of God cannot be chained. It is God and His word that are effective in accomplishing God's will for all creation. We, like the writer of the Pastorals, have a part to play in this, but it is God who directs creation. Like Elisha, we are instruments in God's plan, but our place in the greater scheme of things, our sense of wholeness, wellness, belonging – these are not what we achieve by our own efforts, but what our faith in our God, our faith in connectedness with God and others, our sense of a bigger picture allow us to live into.

GOSPEL READING: Luke 17:11-19

The Gospel reading is Luke's story of the ten lepers. In the story, ten are healed of a physical disease but only one is made well. Ten approached Jesus, a known healer, and expected to be cured. Only one rejoiced in the hand of God working in the world to ease his suffering.

Traditionally, this story is often used to show that it is easy for those on the inside to take things for granted while it is the outsider, the Samaritan, who has true faith, who can be amazed and grateful for the health he experiences. However true this may be, I would suggest that the story also points out the difference between health and wellness. I may be healthy – physically, mentally, and spiritually. Everything is in good working order, but such health may not include wellness, wholeness. Such wholeness comes only from seeing and accepting that the health I experience is a gift. I may become ill and need to see a doctor. I expect the doctor to make me better. Can I see that the availability of a doctor, the medical knowledge that has been achieved over the years, and the possibilities for health are gifts,

are part of God's plan? Can I have a sense of gratitude for God's care or do I expect all things to be manageable with science? Can I see what I experience as moments of connectedness with others, others who interact with me in my experiences or others who experience the same things, as moments of being caught up in something bigger than myself or am I afflicted with terminal uniqueness, a view of the world that is self-centered, looking only to my personal experiences apart from others?

The Samaritan found wholeness, wholeness in a sense of gratitude – gratitude to God who got him where he needed to be to find health, connectedness with Jesus who was the means of God's care and healing, connectedness with the others who shared his experience. In this wholeness, it was his faith that made him well.

FOR REFLECTION:

- What is my understanding of "wellness?" What in my life promotes physical, social, and spiritual wellness? What in my life needs healing?
- Naaman's journey of faith began with the witness of a simple, Israelite serving girl. How do I witness to my faith? Is what I believe evident to others? Does the way I live my faith invite others to experience the wholeness God offers?
- Elisha refused Naaman's gift for helping him. What
 do I expect from my acts of kindness to others? Do
 I expect to be repaid with gratitude? Am I put off
 when I do something for another and do not feel
 fully appreciated?
- God's word and will for his world cannot be chained up. How do I see God's world for His creation working itself out despite me, my weaknesses, my failures, my limitations? Does this give me hope?
- What is my understanding of the difference between health and wellness? Where do I find wholeness in my life? Where to I seek wholeness? How can I live towards the wholeness I seek?
