## Archdiocesan Lenten Regulations

Good Friday (April 22) is a day of abstinence for all Catholics over the age of 14. On these days, fast as well as abstinence is also obligatory for those from the ages of 18 to 59. Abstinence means abstinence from meat. Fast means one full meal a day, with two smaller meals and nothing between meals (liquids are permitted). No Catholic will lightly excuse himself or herself from this obligation.

All other Fridays of Lent (except March 25 this year) are days of abstinence from meat. Here again Catholics will not hold themselves lightly excused, but if there is a serious health problem, this obligation would not apply.

We should strive to make all days of Lent a time of prayer and penance.

## Second Sunday of Lent Cycle A



## THEME: The path to glory leads through suffering for the sake of others.

The Gospel readings for the First Sunday of Lent in all three cycles of readings are accounts of the temptation of Jesus in the wilderness after His baptism by John. On the Second Sunday of Lent the Gospel reading in each of the three cycles is an account of the Transfiguration. Biblical scholarship is uniform in its treatment of the Transfiguration stories. On His way to Jerusalem and His passion and death, Jesus gives His disciples a glimpse of resurrection glory, a glimpse of what is possible, but the path to that glory leads through suffering for the sake of others.

The readings for the First Sunday of Lent focused on human nature and the need to surrender to our God and the relationship He offers us. Today's readings focus on what is possible for us when we make that surrender.

### THE READINGS:

FIRST READING: Genesis 12:1-4

The first reading, from Genesis, follows immediately after the Primeval History and is the first episode in the Abraham cycle of tales – the call of Abraham. Within the context of the developing story of the Pentateuch, the call of Abraham is God's first step in reversing what went wrong in the original plan of creation. He chooses

a man, a human being, to begin to be a means of blessing for all creation, to begin to bring all people back to their God. The call of Abraham bears the stamp of the Jerusalem theology of the Yahwist source. Election is a key theme, but election for a purpose. Israel is chosen to bring God's blessings to all others.

The call of Abraham is the first instance in Genesis of the promises made to the patriarchs – the promise of land, of being a great nation, of having a special relationship with God. These promises translate into the promise of home, of safety and security, of physical well-being; the promise of other people, of social wellbeing; and the promise of a relationship with God, spiritual well-being. But here, and in all instances of the promises, they are given for a purpose – so that all the families of the earth may find blessing, so that all the families of the earth may return to God. There is a second element of the promises to the patriarchs that is worth noting. To live into the promises requires surrender. Abraham is called to leave his homeland, his family, his whole life as he had known it and set off on a journey based solely on trust that God's promises would be fulfilled. In biblical tradition. Abraham is known as the Father of Faith because he does surrender to God and trust in His promises, but the way to that faith and trust was not an easy journey. Repeatedly, Abraham is depicted as doubtful and uncertain, taking matters into his own hands to make sure the promises would be fulfilled and this tendency begins immediately in response to his call. He, in his old age, is told to leave everything behind and trust that he will be the father of a great nation. He sets out, but brings along his nephew, a possible heir if he can't father a child in his old age. In the call of Abraham we hear again God's will for us to experience well-being - physical, social and spiritual, but with a purpose: to share that well-being offered by God with all others. The road to that promised wellbeing is a surrender to God in faith and trust and that, given our human nature, is never an easy road to follow.

SECOND READING: II Timothy 1:8-10
The second reading is from the Second Letter to
Timothy. II Timothy is a late letter, not written by Paul
but drawing on Paul's teaching. It comes from a time
when church order and a basic body of church teaching
has become formalized. This core deposit of teaching
holds out the possibility of holiness for us if we hold
true to our commitment of faith – even in the face of
suffering. Holiness is God-likeness; holiness is
transformational; holiness is a possibility for the world
of humanity if we can surrender to our God.

GOSPEL READING: Matthew 17:1-9

The Gospel reading is Matthew's account of the Transfiguration. The setting for the Transfiguration is on a high mountain, a favorite setting in Matthew for encounters with God. On this mountain, Peter, James and John get a glimpse of Jesus' glory, a preview of resurrection glory. They get a glimpse of what is possible.

In biblical narrative, dialogue holds a place of prominence. Characters reveal their true nature in what they say. The basic meaning that the story-teller wants to convey in an episode is carried in the dialogue. In this brief episode, three voices are heard – that of Peter, that of God, and that of Jesus. On the setting of a high mountain, Jesus is transformed before His disciples and is seen with Moses and Elijah, representatives of the Law and the Prophets. Jesus is on His way to Jerusalem and His final surrender to the Father's will in order to bring the Law and the Prophets to their fulfillment – in order to effect the reconciliation of humanity with its God, forgive sin and win salvation. Along the way there is a glimpse of glory, but the story is not finished.

Enter the voice of Peter: "Lord, it's good to be here. Let's settle in and hang on." Either Peter doesn't realize that there's more to come, that this is but a brief glimpse of the final glory to be won by Jesus, or he does. He knows that Jesus is on His way to Jerusalem and he knows the hostility of the religious leaders in Jerusalem to Jesus. He knows a confrontation is imminent and that it can't turn out well. So, he's willing to settle. "This is good enough. Let's stop here!" Now comes the voice of God: "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased. Listen to him!" Note the structuring elements present here. At the beginning of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus is named Emmanuel, "God is with us." At the end of the Gospel, in the Ascension scene. Jesus promises to be with us until the end of the age. The whole story told by Matthew's Gospel is the story of God being with us. At the beginning of Jesus public life, in the baptism by John, God's voice is heard saying, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." Now, toward the end of Jesus' public life and ministry, in the Transfiguration scene, God's voice again intrudes into the story and we have an exact repetition of God's affirmation of Jesus at His baptism. But there is something added here. God goes on to say, "Listen to him!" Jesus has just been seen in glory with Moses and Elijah, with representatives of the Law and the Prophets, with representatives of God's word to His people. But now God says, "Go beyond my word in scripture and listen to my Son who reveals me, who accomplishes my will for my people."

A constant theme in Matthew's Gospel is that the people of God, the "Chosen People" is not a people determined by blood lines but by those who accept and believe in Jesus the Messiah. The voice of God affirms this claim. If you would be my people, listen to my Son.

Finally comes the voice of Jesus: "Get up. Do not be afraid. Tell no one of the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead." Peter, James and John (and we, too) have just been told by our God to listen to Jesus. And what does He say. He tells us to put fears aside and get moving. He tells us not to focus on the temporary but look to and live for the permanent. He tells us not to settle for what is but to live for what can be, despite our fears and uncertainties, despite our inertia, despite our humanity.

A common theme running through today's readings is the idea that we are faced with boundless possibilities, possibilities for living with our God in a world where God's blessings are shared with all others. But to live into these possibilities requires a surrender to God and His will for us, a surrender to the relationship He offers us and the responsibilities living that relationship places on us. That surrender is never easy. It means letting go, being vulnerable, making sacrifices.

Those who have been hurt, abused, victimized build walls of defenses to protect themselves, to keep from being hurt again. Can the walls come down? Can they trust? Those who are comfortable let go of what is safe and comfortable in their lives to go where God leads them, to live the next chapter of the story? Those who struggle in life are tempted to settle for what is, to be afraid to hope for a better life, a fulfilling relationship, a positive sense of self. Can they refuse to settle for what is and dare to hope for what can be?

### FOR REFLECTION:

- Am I willing to walk the path that Jesus walked, to sacrifice myself for the sake of others? In what ways can I do this?
- As I look at the world, what do I see as God's will for the physical, social and spiritual well-being of all people? What can I do to make God's promises a reality in the world?
- In what ways is it difficult for me to trust that God has a place for me in His plan for all creation? In what ways is it difficult for me to trust that God's promises to me will be fulfilled?
- Faced with the possibilities of the future, faced with all the unknowns of the future, how am I like Peter - ready to settle in and just hang on to the certainty of the present moment?
- What walls have I built to protect myself? What are my hurts and vulnerabilities? How willing am I to break down those walls? How willing am I to trust God and other people?
